CELEBRATING WITH HANOVER COLLEGE

The first event was a special joint reception coordinated with Hanover College to formally mark the long-term loan to the Center of two large portraits of HC alumni, Vice Presidents Thomas Hendricks and Mike Pence.

Huntington Mayor Richard Strick welcomed people to the event and then introduced the chair of the Hanover College Board of Trustees, Elaine Kops Bedel, who formally presented the portraits to the Center.

DQCF Board President Marj Hiner introduced Mike Quayle who accepted the portraits on behalf of the Quayle Family for the Center. Mike delivered a message of congratulations from Vice President Dan Quayle.

Guests of the Center and the College were then invited to enjoy refreshments and mingle among the exhibits.

Following the reception, the Center hosted a community open house. Visitors came continually from the opening and stayed late as they took in the exhibits. Some reminisced about memories of Vice President Quayle's time in office. Some came to see how the Center has changed over the years.
