Hendricks served in the Indiana General Assembly, the House of Representatives, the Senate and Governor of Indiana. He was elected vice president in 1885 with Grover Cleveland, but died only months into his term.



DID YOU KNOW?

Indiana's first three vice presidents were not born in our state? The fourth, Thomas Riley Marshall was born in North Manchester, Indiana and later moved to Columbia City to live and practice law. He was the first native Hoosier.

He was eventually elected Governor in 1908 and vice president in 1912. He served from 1913 to 1921 under President Woodrow Wilson.


For me, there are a couple of thoughts that especially stand out about David.
