QUAYLE COMMEMORATIVE BOARD CONDUCTS LONG RANGE PLANNING

The governing board of directors of the Learning Center held a long range planning meeting at the end of February to examine the vision which will continue to guide the facility's mission.

"One of the important jobs that we, as board members, have is to provide the vision and guidance for the future of the Center", said DQCF Vice President, Ryan Warner. "The past year has presented several changes and opportunities that we feel are important to address."

After affirming that the strength of the Center is its commitment to educational programming, the board identified some key action points:

- 1. Study the incorporation of technology and distance learning opportunities into the Center's curriculum, especially in light of the events of COVID-19.
- 2. Collaborate with other Huntington entities—cultural, educational, businesses, especially downtown.
- 3. Study how to cultivate and invest large gift commitments to the Center toward a long range goal.
- 4. Continue to identify and develop potential new board members.
- 5. Develop a staff compensation strategy.

The Center periodically holds these LRP sessions to lay out a blue-print to follow for the immediate five to ten year period.

The overall mission of the Center is to educate the public, especially schoolchildren, about the Office of the Vice President and all those who have held it, as well as the history and workings of our government.

REMOTE EDUCATIONAL PROGRAMMING

One of the key topics discussed during the Long Range Planning Meeting was the question of how to continue to provide the best educational programming in the realities of the new school/classroom environment.

"Our interactive, role-playing approach to educational programs has been a unique and key strength of the Center," said Executive Director, Daniel Johns. "We look forward to continuing to do that in person, but we are also taking a comprehensive look at how to best provide that content remotely. That's going to take a new approach in terms of technology, manpower and funding to provide that for the schools and students. It's a big undertaking, but we want to accept that challenge."
