RESTROOM RENOVATION


Renovations have begun on the Center's restrooms this summer with fresh paint, flooring, fixtures and a much needed overall facelift! As a second part of this project, the Center is also replacing our water heater and installing a water softener, and a new water bottle filling station is set to replace our old drinking fountain.

The 2022 Efforts For Education campaign will soon be underway this summer.

DID YOU KNOW?

The death of newly elected President William Henry Harrison in 1841 presented a bit of a constitutional crisis for his vice president, John Tyler. Because the Constitution was a bit ambiguous in its wording concerning this situation, it was not known if he would become "Acting President" or truly take the office as President.

Tyler settled the question by taking the oath of office as president. This action settled the debate and set the precedent in place to this day.

To date, nine vice presidents have risen to the presidency through the death or resignation of the previous president.
